## 7 Ways You Can Be an EdTech Advocate

- 1. Learn about CoSN's policy agenda
- 2. Attend candidates' town hall meetings and ask them about their education technology platform. Use the infographic as a guide to questioning them.
- 3. Work with other local groups to identify technology priorities in your community
- 4. Highlight your district's ed tech plans and share them with candidates and the public.
- 5. Invite candidates to visit classrooms and see how technology is transforming learning.
- 6. Write op-eds and letters to the editor describing your education technology practices, priorities, and needs.
- 7. Follow up with notes to all candidates expressing your thanks for their consideration of ed tech policies.
