I currently serve as the Director of Future Ready Learning (CTO) for the School District of Altoona, WI, where I lead technology, data systems, digital literacy, and innovation efforts. In this role I oversee districtwide technology integration, cybersecurity, interoperability, instructional design, and strategic initiatives that ensure all students graduate tomorrow-ready.

My career began as a speech-language pathologist, evolving into roles as technology integration coach and assistive technology coordinator before moving into district technology leadership. This progression gave me a strong foundation in accessibility, pedagogy, and systems thinking.

Key accomplishments in Altoona include:

Digital Literacy Equity: Implemented a K–5 digital literacy sequence, including technology electives in early grades. This ensures consistent skill development across classrooms and equitable readiness for secondary, college, and career learning.

Student Tech Intern Program: Designed a student internship program where learners repair 1:1 devices. This builds authentic work experience and career skills while providing cost savings for the district.

Data-Driven Equity: Built accurate, disaggregated data systems to identify gaps and red-flag concerns, helping close opportunity gaps for students from marginalized backgrounds.

AI Integration: Guided teachers in using AI responsibly, building ethical frameworks, and co-creating student supports that balance innovation with protection.

Continuous Improvement in CTO Domains: Embedded continuous improvement into every area of technology leadership—cybersecurity, interoperability, digital literacy, and instructional technology—by studying data, setting goals, and taking incremental steps. This ensures progress in the most critical areas of a CTO’s responsibility is systematic and sustainable.

Identify the top two priorities that you believe CoSN should prioritize over the next three years.

The two priorities I believe CoSN should focus on over the next three years are member engagement and staying agile with rapid technology change.

1. Member Engagement, Chapter Health, and Onboarding.

CoSN’s greatest strength is its people. Members join for the resources, but they stay because of the relationships and the support they find in this community. Chapters and committees are where that happens—where leaders connect, learn from each other, and bring national resources back home. We need to keep those spaces strong by supporting chapter health, making sure new members feel welcomed, and celebrating the contributions of people who step up to lead. When members feel seen and supported, they stay involved and grow into the next generation of leaders.

2. Agility and Responsiveness to Technology Change.

The pace of change in our work is not slowing down. AI, cybersecurity, interoperability—districts can’t afford to play catch-up. CoSN has to keep providing timely, practical guidance that helps members turn new challenges into opportunities. That means not just talking about emerging issues, but sharing tools, stories, and frameworks that leaders can use right away in their own districts. The faster CoSN can respond, the more confident and prepared members will feel when they go back to their communities.

By centering these two priorities, CoSN will empower members to lead with confidence, build resilient local chapters, and respond to emerging challenges in ways that create lasting, positive impact for schools.
