I have spent more than 16 years in the education technology field, partnering with school districts, state agencies, and education leaders to design and implement solutions that strengthen teaching, learning, and operational resilience. My work has consistently focused on aligning technology strategies with the real-world needs of K12 schools.

Over the next three years, I believe CoSN should focus on two key priorities:

1. Cybersecurity, Human Risk, and Responsible Al

Cybersecurity is one of the biggest threats facing schools today. Ransomware and data breaches disrupt learning and put students at risk, yet many districts lack the training and resources to stay protected. CoSN should continue to lead by promoting security awareness for staff and students, encouraging real-world threat reporting, and helping leaders address human risk. At the same time, artificial intelligence brings both opportunity and risk. Schools need guidance on using AI responsibly, protecting student data, ensuring ethical use, and training staff to integrate AI in ways that support, not replace, educators. Together, cybersecurity and AI form the foundation of safe, future-ready digital learning.

2. Equity and Sustainable Digital Access

The digital divide still limits opportunity for too many students. CoSN should keep driving efforts to ensure every learner has reliable access to devices, connectivity, and the skills to use them well. Beyond access, districts need sustainable funding and strong professional development so technology improves learning for all students

Focusing on security/AI and equity will help schools stay safe, innovative, and inclusive.
